FROG HOTEL

Follow the instructions below to build your own frog hotel to provide a safe haven for frogs in your garden, encouraging them to stay and help control pests naturally.

MATERIALS NEEDED

- Large terracotta pot or a similar container (a broken one works well because it needs an entrance)
- · Pebbles and rocks
- Waterproof pond liner or heavyduty plastic (if the container isn't waterproof)
- · Sand
- Native water plants (like water lilies or duckweed)
- · Mulch or bark
- · Garden spade
- Water

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1 Choose a shady, quiet spot near a water source
- Use a large container such as a terracotta pot lined with a pond liner or heavy plastic if it's not waterproof. Create an entrance in the rim or side large enough for a frog to pass through with no sharp edges where you created the entrance.
- Cover the base with pebbles or small rocks to ensure good drainage and add a layer of sand over the rocks to stabilise the interior base and support plant roots.
- Fill the container halfway with water and add native aquatic plants which will help keep the water clean and provide hiding spots for the frogs.
- Arrange larger rocks and logs partially submerged around the edge of the container to provide shelter and basking spots for the frogs.
- Around the container, lay a thick layer of mulch or bark to keep the area moist and cool. This also provides a good environment for insects, which are a food source for frogs.

Maintaining the Frog Hotel

Keep an eye on your frog hotel to see who moves in. It may take a little time for the frogs to discover your hotel, but once they do, you need to:

- 1. Keep the water level consistent by adding water during dry periods.
- 2. Clean out debris regularly to prevent the water from becoming stagnant.
- 3. Avoid using chemicals like pesticides and herbicides in and around the frog hotel to keep it safe for amphibians.
